Key Dates in Israel's Death and Resurrection

- o 722 BC Northern Kingdom (Israel/Ephraim) conquered by Assyrians
 - Southern Kingdom (Judah) forced to pay tribute to Assyrians after they conquered Israel
- o Babylonians defeated Assyrians and Egyptians to become new world power.
- Babylonian subjugation of Judah and deportation of exiles
 - 605 BC 1st Babylonian exiles (Daniel & co.)
 - 597 BC Jerusalem overtaken and 2nd group of exiles deported (Ezekiel)
 - 586 BC Jerusalem destroyed by Babylonians; 3rd group of exiles
- 539 BC Persians conquer Babylonians
- Cyrus and return from Exile (3 groups)
 - 538 BC Edict of Cyrus and rebuilding of Temple begins
 - 458 BC Ezra returns with exiles
 - 444 BC Nehemiah returns with exiles
 - 430-420 BC probable dates of Malachi's ministry

- **A.** Protological separation: covenant election (1:2-5)
 - B. Contempt of covenant privileges: blemished sacrifices (1:6-14)
 - C. Protological messengers: Levites (2:1-9)
 - **D.** Marital covenant bond in the Spirit (2:10-16)
 - C'. Eschatological messenger: Christ (2:17-3:6)
 - B'. Contempt of privileges: failure to tithe (3:7-15)
- A'. Eschatological separation: judgment (3:16-4:6)
- **A.** God loved Israel by setting them apart as His covenant people and by restoring them after exile,
 - **B.** But Israel showed contempt for God's covenantal love by offering defiled sacrifices with a flippant attitude.
 - **C.** The Levites were charged with maintaining the covenant and leading the people in proper worship,
 - **D.** But as often as not, they actually led the people into spiritual adultery with women who worshipped idols.
 - **C'.** As a result, God promised to send the messenger of the covenant to judge the people and cleanse them so that their worship would be acceptable.
 - **B'.** In view of coming judgment, God called on Israel to submit to Him, obey His commandments (especially tithing), and receive the promised blessings.
- **A'.** God's judgment separates those who repent and obey God's commands, who will be blessed, from the rebellious, who will be cursed and consumed.
